SET ASIDE THE REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS: MEETING OF JUNE 15, 2017

Retirement well wishes and Appreciation Award issued to Mr. Robert Burlew 1.

Presentation of the School Budget by Dr. Ridley and Ms. Ertle

Motion to set aside the regular order of business of the meeting of June 15, 2017 moved by Councilman Wicki, seconded by Councilman Cocuzza and approved by voice vote.

Mayor Smith calls Mr. Robert Burlew to receive a plaque from the Mayor and Council in appreciation for all his work as our Construction Official over the past 17 years and especially since Hurricane Sandy. We wish him all the best in his retirement. The Borough will be thankful to him forever for saving the face of Union Beach after Hurricane Sandy. We can't thank him enough.

Mr. Burlew addresses the audience and says that it has been an honor and a pleasure to be here for 17 years. Working together is the key to making sure we are better tomorrow. He tanks all who have worked with him and asks all to take care of our OEM and Emergency Services.

POINT OF ORDER: Mayor Smith thanks Dr. Ridley for putting the Governing Body in the sun today at graduation. Mayor Smith comments on Dr. Ridley's great speech today.

Mayor Smith calls for Dr. Ridley and Ms. Ertle to present the 2017-2018 School Budget. Dr. Ridley goes over some highlights as to what the budget will purchase and Mrs. Ertle, Business Administrator will then give specifics.

Dr. Ridley states that with the economic challenges we face their priority is to maintain as many programs, assets, staff and financial opportunities as possible. The 2017-2018 budget supports the thorough and efficient education of 830 students in grades PK through 12. 585 elementary students and 215 High School students, 16 vocational school students and 21 out of district students. Their budget expectations and their educational objectives will have a commitment to improve student achievement, they will provide a safe and secure learning environment, they will maintain and improve all existing instructional programs, they will maintain class size averages conducive to learning, and they will make a commitment to maintain the school facilities. This budget will include: part time guidance counselor, summer arts and technology academies, readers-writers workshop integration, K12 AVA classroom, instructional supplies and curriculum writing. It will also include a commitment to continue professional development and an increase in classroom level libraries, interactive smartboards for preschool classes, K3 text books, Social Studies Text Books, Math Big Idea Grade 6-8 text books, Fast Forward Reading Assistant, HIB Assemblies and Pre-K Assemblies. The Budget will also include District-Wide safety and security upgrades including a school security officer (already in place), a digital surveillance cameras and enhancements (already in place), security protective window film (already in place), additional exterior lighting, shared 911 and school safety assemblies. District-Wide technology upgrades will include upgrading our bandwidth, our wireless, additional projectors (including in the media center), additional IPADS for students, Chrome Boxes and Technology Professional development. Capital Projects including the girls locker room renovation, sidewalk repairs around and at the front of the school. Facility projects equipment including water fountain replacements, maintenance equipment, grounds care and up-keep equipment, preschool playground equipment and athletic equipment so that we can continue to fund all of our athletic clubs and extra-curricular activities.

Ms. Ertle presents the financial highlights of the Union Beach 2017-2018 Budget. She states that with the elimination of the Community Disaster Loan in the 2016-2017 School Budget, we reverted back to the tax levy pre-Sandy to the 2013 tax levy at \$6,498,000 and change. Be it not for the Hurricane Sandy Community Disaster Loan over the course of the three school years, the district could have seen a significant increase in its tax levy. Using the 2012-2013 school year as a base, through the 20172018 school year, we could have experienced a tax levy of almost \$700,000.00 if a 2% per year tax increase was utilized. This Budget year, if the district would have permitted to use not only 2% increase in the tax levy, but also what is called banked cap. If we don't increase our levy by the 2% every year, we are permitted to use bank cap. It is a permitted adjustment and it is also a permitted adjustment for increased health benefits which have gone up over 15%. If both were utilized, which we did not use them, we would have had almost a 6% increase in our tax levy. We maintain with the Board's direction and Administration's recommendation a 2% tax levy for the 2017-2018 school year. Going through the actual financial highlights, State Aid remained flat, Preschool Aid decreased, Administrative Costs are below the state level, our budgetary pupil costs are a little higher than the state average because our class sizes are decreasing. As she said earlier the 2% levy would have been in effect in the 2013-2014 school year at the level we are looking at right now. If we progressed forward and did 2% per year since the Hurricane Sandy days it would have been almost 11% tax increase of almost \$700,000.00. This is really significant. She speaks about Borough's participation needed in the documentation of the Community Disaster Loan as a requirement of the State to start the repayment process of that loan.

The Board is always looking for cost saving initiatives. They do cooperative purchasing, shared services including shared services with the Borough (dental plan, sidewalk project, Police Department Officer, Construction Office Location) We all work together for the common goal. They continue to do other shared services with regard to transportation services. These things help to save money in the picture.

Revenues: Tax Levy and State Aid which represent almost 90% of their overall revenue for budget. There is very little funding coming from the Federal Government and some small miscellaneous revenues that we receive be it tuition revenue, but the bulk is the Tax Levy and State Aid.

Expenses: The bulk of their contract and expenses are salary, benefits, tuition and transportation. This approaches 85% of their overall budget. There are other contract expenses such as utilities, property insurance which leaves very few dollars left for any type of discretionary spending. They manage a tight ship in trying to make sure that all of their programs remain in tact. With the increase of tax levy from the 2016-2017 to 2017-2018 school year, it will represent almost \$130,000.00 tax levy increase for the upcoming school year for a tax rate of 0.151 cents. This is basically 3 pennies in terms based on the net taxable value in the 2016-2017 school year. A penny is worth about \$52,000.00. It is less than 3 cents. Based on the average assessed value of \$211,472.00 the tax levy for school purposes will be approximately \$32.00 per assessed value.

Review an email that was sent to the Borough Administrator regarding the Borough's need to approve and acknowledge the repayment of the Community Disaster Loan. In summary we were obligated to obtain a Community Disaster Loan when Hurricane Sandy first happened in amount of \$900,000.00 (round numbers) Because of insurance monies, they are able to budget to pay half of it back in the 2017-2018 school year which will have no effect on the tax levy whatsoever. Going forward, they are looking to pay back the remaining \$450,000.00 over 5 years which will minimally impact the tax levy. They are taking the opportunity in the 2017-2018 school year to do this outside the levy which benefits everyone. It is funds that we had set aside from insurance purposes. It is a prudent thing to do. They are mindful not to increase the tax levy, so they are looking to perhaps over 5 years the remaining \$450,000.00 being paid back commencing in the 2018-2019 school year. It will be a tax levy for debt service which they have never had since she has been with the District. It is something that they are required to do and it is something that the Department of Education requires for this 2017-2018 school year that the Borough grants permission to repay this. She welcomes any questions.

Mr. Wicki has a question as to the repayment of the CDL and what the role the Borough pays in this since we had no role in you taking the loan or utilizing it.

Mrs. Ertle had reached out to the state and reads to the Mayor and Council their response to her: "The DOE asks all municipalities of those school districts who have a CDL and wish to repay a portion/all of the CDL in advance of the due date of the loan (due July, 2018) to acknowledge such action in writing. The written acknowledgement by the muni helps foster the understanding of the tax levy/debt service levy assessed to the community by the district for such portion of debt incurred through the Executive Order 128 that mandated the district participation of the program. It also ensures that the community is able to afford the advance payment in the current year levy without significant burden to the community. Once the loan becomes due and payable, the acknowledgement is no longer necessary." So the next school year, the 2018-2019 school year the Borough's permission/written acknowledgement is not necessary.

Mr. Wicki asks where this request comes from.

Ms. Ertle: this request comes from the New Jersey Department of Education.

Mr. Wicki: It is just odd as we never had any input into your budget.

Ms. Ertle: She understands. It is a valid point and it is in the budget guideline documents so they are required to do it and her recommendation was certainly supported by the Board of Education and Dr. Ridley. It is funds that we have that enable them to pay back half of it as opposed to taking that \$900,000.00 and increasing the tax levy for debt service. This is something where they really want to pay back as much as they could.

Mr. Wicki: He understands and agrees with this but is confused about why it comes to the Mayor and Council to approve it as we would have no say in their budget.

Ms. Ertle agrees with Mr. Wick and that is why she had reached out to the State for an explanation.

Mr. Cocuzza: What steps will be taken according to actual 2015-2016 school enrollment to your estimated 2017 student enrollment. You are down 40 students. What steps is the district going to take. He assumes that this is a loss in revenue also.

Ms. Ertle: Right now there has been no decrease in State aid. If the Governor and the Legislature at the State level are considering changing the funding formula which will probably negatively impact Union Beach because we have not seen a decrease in State Aid for many years. Some of the positive things that we are doing is that we are now opening up our preschool program to 3 years old (regular education).

Dr. Ridley states that 23 people are enrolled and we have a waiting list of 3.

Ms. Ertle: These are good things that we are doing.

Ms. Roche: Will you have to hire more teachers for this.

Dr. Ridley: No class sizes are just going to get a little larger than they were but not beyond control. The Preschool classes were 8-10 now they will be 14-16. Their intention and he believes the State is going in this direction as well is to have full day preschool. This will be a couple of years away.

Ms. Ertle states that the theory is that if we bring them in when they are three they will stay until they are 14.

Dr. Ridley states that two teachers are not being rehired this school year and they are not replacing them. This speaks to the fact that they are down some students.

Mayor Smith comments on the loss of a good bus driver and all wish Lidia Gallopo a Happy Retirement. She will be missed.

Public Hearing before the Mayor and Council FY 2018 Community Development Block Grant Application / Proposal

Project: St. James Avenue Reconstruction

Mayor Smith: announces that this portion of our meeting is the Public Hearing on the Community Development Block Grant Application which is Federal funds administered through the County that you can apply for every two years and we also have a map that limits to where we can apply. This map is given to us from the Federal Government. Mayor calls upon Mr. Dennis Dayback of T&M Associates, the Borough Engineering Firm and Consultant to the Citizen's Advisory Committee, to make presentation of the Project to be submitted to the County of Monmouth for the FY 2018 projects program, as recommended by the Citizens Advisory Committee at their public meeting of June 8, 2017.

Presentation by Engineer

Mr. Dayback presents the Borough's application for the 2018 Community Development Block Grant Program. As the Mayor stated this is funding that is available to the Borough every two years. It is federally funded and through Monmouth County. Every other year we have an opportunity to apply for this funding. We have been successful in the past in road reconstruction. We have done a lot of roads in the Borough with CDBG funds as well as DOT funds. It is a big part of our road improvement program. Last year our application was Johnson Avenue. We reconstructed Johnson. Prior to that was Seventh Street. We have been doing this for almost 25 years. This year's application is for the reconstruction of St. James from Poole Avenue to Tenth Street.

is a street that we reconstructed last year using municipal funds. Again, it is a total reconstruction it will be curbs, drainage. We reconstruct all the roads at 28 feet wide. That allows for two-way traffic. This neighborhood has no sidewalks. There will be no sidewalks. The road will be completely removed and replaced. We replace our pavement with a new road section that is 6" in pavement, 4" of stabilized base, 2" of top. The road will be re-profiled for drainage. Drainage pipe will be installed as we do on all our roads. The total approximate cost for this project will be \$246,000.00. The grant limit is \$200,000.00. In the past we have been very successful. We don't get the full grant, but we are probably one of the top municipalities in receiving funding. All of our applications if it is \$246,000.00 the Borough always funds the remaining portion so we will build if we are successful the entire project. Again, this is continuing in this neighborhood. As he said Tenth Street was done last year and Edmunds Avenue was done in 2003 with CDBG money. Poole Avenue was done back in the late 1990's with DOT Funds. If we are successful, we will be under construction by next year if the Federal Government releases the money in time.

Mayor Smith asks for any comments from the Council.

Mayor Smith also advises that the Public Hearing before the Mayor and Council was duly advertised in a Blocked Ad in the Asbury Park Press on May 18, 2017, in accordance with the CD Guidelines.

Ordinance 2017-255:

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A RESTRICTED
PARKING SPACE IN FRONT OF 20 ANDERSON STREET
FOR THE SOLE USE OF MARY JANE AND ROGER MICHALAK WHO RESIDE AT
20 ANDERSON STREET AND ARE PERMANENTLY DISABLED

WHEREAS, pursuant to NJSA 39:4-197 any Municipality may by ordinance establish a restricted parking zone in front of a residence occupied by a handicapped person if a windshield placard or wheelchair symbol license plates have been issued for a vehicle owned by the handicapped person, or by another occupant of the residence who is a member of the immediate family of the handicapped person, by the Division of Motor Vehicles pursuant to the provisions of P.L. 1949, c. 280 (C.39:4-204 et seq.) provided such parking is not otherwise prohibited and the permitting thereof would not interfere with the normal flow of traffic; and

WHEREAS, Mary Jane and Roger Michalak who reside at the premises located at 20 Anderson Street, Borough of Union Beach, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey and are permanently disabled and have requested that the Borough of Union Beach establish a restricted parking space in front of 20 Anderson Street, for their sole use.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Union Beach, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey that:

- A restricted parking space shall be established in front
 of 20 Anderson Street for the use of Mary Jane and Roger Michalak, this space shall be for their sole use and shall
 cease to exist upon they no longer being residents of 20 Anderson Street.
- 2. Prior to the establishment of the aforementioned restricted parking space, the residents of 20 Anderson Street, Mary Jane and Roger Michalak shall furnish the Borough of Union Beach with her special vehicle identification card or a certified copy thereof, which must be issued to them by the Division of Motor Vehicles pursuant to law.
- 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage according to law and after Mary Jane and Roger Michalak provide to the Borough of Union Beach with their special vehicle identification card or a certified copy thereof as mentioned herein.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment.

Ordinance 2017-256

Ordinance 2017-256:

An Ordinance Amending an Ordinance Entitled "The Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Union Beach, 1980-," Chapter XII Streets and Sanitation, Section 12-7

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Union Beach, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey, that the following Chapter of an Ordinance entitled The Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Union Beach, 1980-," Chapter XII Streets and Sanitation, Section 12-7 be and the same is hereby amended and supplemented in the following manner.

12-7 DUMPSTER/CONTAINER PERMITS.

12-7.1 Permits Required.

No person shall place a dumpster, waste container or storage container on or adjacent to property without first having obtained a permit. The construction official shall not issue a construction or demolition permit unless the applicant has identified the manner of the disposal or recycling of the debris/waste to be generated by the construction and/or demolition. If dumpster(s), waste container(s), and/or storage container(s) will be necessary to store and remove the debris/waste or stored goods, and/or equipment, the applicant shall first obtain a "dumpster" permit from the department of public works. A copy of each "dumpster" permit issued by the department of public works shall be forwarded to the borough clerk, construction official and police department.

12-7.2 Permit Fee.

The fee for a "dumpster" permit shall be thirty (\$30.00) dollars per dumpster/waste container and/or storage container payable to the Borough of Union Beach. After removal of the dumpster/waste container and/or storage container, the applicant must provide written proof of compliance with all requirements of this section and other ordinances along with all other applicable statutes and regulations.

12-7.3 Site Requirements.

The "dumpster" permit must be placed by the applicant in a conspicuous location on or about the dumpster/waste container and/or storage container. Dumpster(s)/waste container(s) and/or storage container(s) shall not be placed in a street and/or public right-of-way without the approval of the Traffic and Safety Officer of the Union Beach Police Department. Any dumpster/waste container and/or storage container placed in the street and/or public right-of-way will be required to have reflective devices placed on all corners of the dumpster/waste container and/or storage container and cones along the front, back and sides facing the street. It will be the responsibility of the applicant to maintain the safety apparatus for the duration of the permit. No dumpster/waste container and/or storage container shall remain on any street or right-of-way for more than thirty (30) days after the issuance of the "dumpster" permit. It will be the responsibility of the applicant to protect street surfaces, curbs, sidewalks and other public facilities to avoid damage caused by the placement of the dumpster/waste container and/or storage container.

12-7.4 Civil Remedies for Noncompliance.

Damage caused by the placement of the dumpster/waste container and/or storage container to street surfaces, curbs, sidewalks and other public facilities will be the responsibility of the applicant to repair. The cost of inspecting and approving the repair shall be a lien upon the property serviced by the dumpster/waste container and/or storage container. Any dumpster/waste container and/or storage container which remains on a public street or right-of-way for more than thirty (30) days or for which the proper safety apparatus is not maintained will be subject to removal by the borough and the cost of such removal shall be a lien upon the property serviced by the dumpster/waste container and/or storage container. These civil remedies are in addition to and supplementary to fines and penalties imposed pursuant to subsection 12-7.5.

12-7.5 Enforcement.

- a. Violations. This section shall be enforced by the department of public works, the Police Department of the Borough of Union Beach, the Union Beach Code Enforcement Bureau, the Board of Health, or any other official or officer of the Borough of Union Beach.
- b. Penalties. Any person who is convicted of a violation of this section shall be subject to a fine not to exceed two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars and/or a term of imprisonment not to exceed 90 days or a period of community service not exceeding 90 days, or both.
 - c. Each day that a violation shall continue to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

Councilman Wicki

Finance, Personnel, Administration & Code Enforcement

Mr. Wicki discusses the independent Audit conducted each year in compliance with the Audit requirements presented by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. The Audit considers the Borough's internal control over financial reporting and tests our compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. At the conclusion of the Audit, recommendations are made to the Governing Body for any changes which must be made for the Borough to remain in compliance. The Mayor and each Council person has signed and affidavit stating that they have reviewed the audit and are aware of any recommendations presented. He is pleased to report that once again there are no recommendations presented in this year's audit and the Borough of Union Beach is in full compliance. The Borough has received notification that we have received an award from the 2017 New Jersey Department of Transportation Municipal Aid Grant Program in the amount of \$210,000.00. Our application is for the reconstruction of Arlington and Newark Avenues from Johnson to Stone Road. This will be included in our 2018 Capital Improvement Program. This is a very competitive program. The State received 628 applications for over \$270,000,000.00 vying for only \$78,000,000.00 available. We are very fortunate to have been successful on this application. The Borough is very grateful to Edward Broberg, Dennis Dayback and Robert M. Howard, Jr. for their hard work and successful application. We could not have done it without them. More good news, the Mayor and Council had been advised in November of 2016 that we had been awarded a grant in the amount of over \$617,000.00 for reimbursement of our 10% cost share for the monies we spent primarily for debris removal immediately following Hurricane Sandy. We were recently notified that the amount of the grant has been increased to over \$692,000.00, an increase of almost \$75,000.00. This is great news and very helpful because we are utilizing a lot of that grant money to help offset the cost of our Borough Hall Construction Project.

ORDINANCE 2017 -259:

Ordinance Amending Ordinance relating to Fence Regulations

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION XIII (LAND USE AND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS) OF THE GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF UNION BEACH TO AMEND CERTAIN PROVISIONS REGARDING THE HEIGHT OF PRINCIPAL STRUCTURES.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Union Beach, County of Monmouth, and State of New Jersey that Section XIII (Land Use and Development Regulations) of the General Ordinances of the Borough of Union Beach is hereby amended or supplemented as follows:

PURPOSE

The purpose of this ordinance is to amend or add certain definitions, general provisions, design standards and general zoning provisions to incorporate changes to clarify the requirement regarding fences, steps and ramps as recommended by the Acting Zoning Official.

Chapter XIII (Land Use and Development Regulations) of the General Ordinances of the Borough of Union Beach is hereby amended or supplemented as follows (new text is double <u>underlined</u>, text to be deleted is struck through and notations to the reader and changes in subparagraph designations either with or without changes to content are italicized):

SECTION 1

Chapter XIII (Land Use and Development Regulations), Section 13-5 (General Provisions), Subsection 13-5.5 (Yard Areas) shall be amended as follows:

13-5.5 <u>Yard Areas.</u>

a. (No Change)

o. (No Change)

c. Every part of a required yard shall be open and unobstructed from its lowest level to the sky, except for the ordinary projections allowed by the State Uniform Construction Code including, but not limited to, sills, belt courses, chimneys, flues, buttresses, ornamental features, and eaves, provided, however, that none of the aforesaid projections shall project into the minimum required yards more than 24 inches unless otherwise permitted by this chapter. Unroofed entrance porches, terraces, <u>ADA ramps</u>, stairs and landings which do not rise above the height of the floor level of the ground floor may extend <u>up to five (5) feet into the required side yard; up to ten (10) feet into any required front yard and up to ten (10) feet into any required rear yard providing the total area of all such porches, terraces, <u>ADA ramps</u>, stairs and landings which extend into such yards, does not exceed 1,000 square feet</u>

SECTION 2

Chapter XIII (Land Use and Development Regulations), Section 13-8 (Design Standards and Improvement Specifications), Subsection 13-8.13 (Fences and Hedges) shall be amended to read as follows:

13-8.13 <u>Fences and Hedges</u>

- a. Fences, hedges and walls hereafter erected, altered or reconstructed in any zone in the borough shall not exceed six feet in height above ground level except as follows:
 - 1. Hedges, walls and fences, which are not open fences as defined in this chapter, subsection 13-2.3(a), 54 "Fence, open", located in a front yard, or located within 5 feet of a side (secondary front) yard of a corner lot fronting on a street, or within 50 feet of any river, lagoon or other body of water, shall not exceed 36 inches in height. Fences, hedges and walls which are set back greater than 5 feet from the side property line corner lot fronting on a street shall not exceed 6 feet in height.

SECTION 3

If any section, subsection, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 4

The Municipal Clerk is hereby directed, upon adoption of the Ordinance after public hearing thereon, to publish notice of the passage thereof and to file a copy of this Ordinance as finally adopted with the Monmouth County Planning Board as required by N.J.S.40:55D-16. The Mayor and Council of the Borough of Union Beach is aware that certain equipment available in the RTD system will not be approved by the State Coordinator. These items include, but are not limited to: bayonets, combat gloves, and simulated rocket launchers. *Actual weapons are not available on the RTD system.

The Mayor and Council of the Borough of Union Beach finds that the Borough of Union Beach, Police Department may request and acquire any DEMILA (non-controlled) property in the RTD system without restriction.

The Mayor and Council of the Borough of Union Beach finds that the Union Beach Police Department may request and acquire certain DEMIL B thru H (controlled) property in the RTD system. It has been determined that based on the needs of this venue, law enforcement may not acquire armored tactical vehicles or marine vessels over 28' without approval of the Mayor and Council.

Any special application for weapons, aircraft, or MRAP's must be authorized by the Mayor and Council prior to the submission of the application.

The Mayor and Council of the Borough of Union Beach recognizes that the acquisition of 1033 Program property is time-sensitive as resources are allocated to all States based on time-stamp of requisition. In the event that a LESO Point of Contact requests an item in good faith and said item is determined to be contrary to the intent of the resolution, the LESO Point of Contact may cancel the request prior to the acquisition of the property, without being in violation of S2364 2(a).

Discussion:

Attorney, John T. Lane, Jr.: To refresh everyone's recollection, there was only one person who spoke here this evening. Last year we approved this with four (4) special conditions:

- 1. The outside bar is required to close at 10 p.m. on weekdays and 11 p.m. on weekends. After these hours alcoholic beverages must remain inside. All outside music, audio and television must be turned off.
- 2. The applicant must place a sign at each door containing the following language: "This bar has neighbors who live nearby, you should be quiet while walking to your car. Before you leave, please use the restroom facilities. Please do not litter on our neighbors lawns.
- 3. At least four (4) cameras, at least two (2) inside and two (2) outside need to be installed within 30 days with videos recorded and a 30-day retention and shall allow for private viewing by the Police.

Attorney: I believe 1, 2, and 3 were all done. The fourth one – what the condition originally was

4. There shall be a uniformed off-duty Police Officer outside the door from 9:30 p.m. until 2:30 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Said Officer shall be secured through the Borough of Union Beach if possible.

These were ratified by the Director of ABC as being appropriate, lawful. No one took an appeal last year. It is currently closed. Mr. Plinio could open tomorrow and the current conditions would only apply if you repassed them. Anyone who were to buy this license would have to come here for a person-to-person transfer. At that time, you could keep these restrictions, eliminate the restrictions, and do several things. He has a right to appeal the restrictions if you place them back on. He has to do that within 20 days of today by filing a notice of appeal to the Director of ABC. If he were to do that, I believe the Commission conducts an immediate review of the conditions which they previously approved and would decide whether or not they into effect during the process while they are hearing is heard. So it is really the Council's pleasure as to which, if any, of these special conditions they want to continue to place on this license.

Councilman Wicki: I wouldn't mind re-discussing opening up restriction number four (4). At last week's meeting our Attorney did go through the various violations which had happened after the date of when we put these restrictions on the license and they were approved by the ABC and they did not seem terribly egregious as much as they were more of a nuisance in nature. I don't know if we can revisit this and alter this or change it in any way.

Councilman Cocuzza: Based on everything that has occurred, I would prefer that the Union Beach Police Department only be involved with an establishment when they are called. They are not security guards.

Councilwoman Roche: I agree private security.

Councilman Cocuzza: This went completely as it was not supposed to and security guards, how it is worked out, we can discuss that however we want to do that I just don't believe the Union Beach Police Department should be involved in something..... obviously, we receive the phone calls, we responded, Police Officers did their job, but looking at everything that has transpired over the last 45 days, going back a little further, I don't feel comfortable having our Police Department there doing it. They will be there if the residents call. They will be there if something takes place, something happens.

Councilman Wicki: If the noise in other areas of the restrictions are not adhered to, then our Police would respond to that as necessary.

Councilman Cocuzza: Right, like I said with everything that has taken place...

Councilman Wicki: but a private security detail as it were.

Councilman Cocuzza: we are not in the security guard business and that clearly showed.

Councilman Wicki: Yes, I mean I definitely feel for the residents live nearby and their concern with the noise and

Councilman Cocuzza: I am not saying no security – I am saying don't use the Police Department as it. You require some sort of security, the Police will still be there.

Councilman Wicki: The Police need to be there when the noise ordinance is violated. The Police need to be there for that

Councilman Cocuzza: Every time the residents called, the Police responded. I just don't think again, we are not in the security guard business.

Councilman Wicki: Yes, if someone has an opened container on the street, the Police should respond to that. Again, from what we heard last week, there were – I am not saying never happened, but I don't think it happened in the frequency that would dictate us to have our Police there.

Councilman Andreuzzi: I support the private security thing but they have to have security.

Councilwoman Roche: Private security.

Attorney: This is what I thought maybe would work: "there shall be a private security presence licensed by the State of New Jersey. Now that is like private investigators have licenses. There are licensed security people who provide – sometimes they provide security at safe venues. They have a license. They are going to do a good job. Having the Police there did cause some problems that were public and we only have 16 Officers and it really would stretch them to have people there. (15 now) There was a stretch there some nights to cover it, I think one of the problems and nobody in the surrounding towns, which I thought would be, we were advised that nobody responded to the requests. I don't know if it was made, but we did not seem to have enough bodies sometimes.

Mayor: What is your pleasure?

Councilman Wicki makes a motion that we keep the three restrictions as is and amend the fourth restriction to as to Mr. Lane had just dictated. Councilman Cocuzza seconds the motion.
