WHEREAS, Gary W. Whyte, of Mountainside, New Jersey, having just completed his 13th Annual Comedy Show Fund Raiser for FOP in which monies raised go directly towards the purchase of research equipment.

And Michele Charlesworth of Channel 7 Eyewitness News who attended the March fund raiser and spoke about it on her Sunday morning broadcast the next day; and

WHEREAS, Fibrodysplasia Ossificans Progressiva is a rare genetic condition in which the body makes additional bone where bone should not form, such as within muscle, tendons, ligaments and other connective tissues. Symptoms of FOP include excruciating pain and distortion of the existing skeletal frame; and

WHEREAS, A gene has been identified after 15 years of hard research by the University of Pennsylvania, the only known research facility currently investigating a cure for this; and

WHEREAS, Discoveries made in the FOP lab by scientists and researchers may aid in the treatment or cure for other genetic diseases such as osteoporosis, arthritis, and spinal cord injuries; and

WHEREAS, The symptoms of FOP usually begin in the first or second decade of life, with the majority of patients diagnosed by age 10, depriving children of normal development. One in every seven Americans suffers from musculoskeletal impairment causing physical disability and severe long-term pain. FOP affects approximately 2,500 people worldwide; and

WHEREAS, The Borough of Union Beach commends Gary W. Whyte and his wife and three sons for their dedication in making others aware of this affliction and for their work and support for the benefit of FOP research;

Councilman Mascilak: Library, Drug Alliance, EMS and Seniors

The April arts and crafts collected \$15.00 for a total of \$33.50. May 10th was the Mother's Day Bake Sale. Discussions were held on upcoming events such as Bowling Fundraiser in August to pair with a Kohls Grant of \$500 for volunteers. It would be \$9.99 per child including two hours of bowling, shoes, pizza or hot dogs and soft drink.

<u>Seniors</u> – OEM presented Seniors readiness for Storms – family disaster plans which they asked the Seniors to fill out information for readiness measures. Mike Oppenguard from the Monmouth County Sheriffs Office of Emergency Management. They were asked to complete the information packages. They will come back in two weeks to collect if for the registry which will help in the future for preparedness. It was a great presentation and very informative. The Seniors are going out to Lunch on June 10th to celebrate Mothers & Father's Day and they thank Anne Marie for the substantial increase in the parking spaces.

They have a beginning balance of \$1,382.14.

<u>Drug Alliance</u> - The deposits through the third and fourth grade dance plus two teen dances \$719.66 and Keyport High School outgoing \$85.00 for an ending balance of \$2,016. 80.

A Basket was provided to the PTA gift auction. Amount given for the dances was \$543.00 and \$176.41. Letters from Memorial School and Keyport High School were received requesting recipients for the Drug Alliance Award. Awards will be given to Dylan Stoppiello at Memorial School and Jacob Andrews at Keyport High School. The May dance has been changed to the 9th.

The field maintenance questions have arisen regarding the driving of equipment on the fields as it relates to the Drug Alliance Picnic. —to be discussed at June Agenda Meeting with Engineer as to what will be allowed on the field and the timeframes, etc.

He thanks the Rutgers for all the time they put into their projects.

Councilman Wicki: Finance, Personnel and Administration

Mr. Wicki discusses the bid opening for the reconstruction of the intersections of Spruce, Center at 5th Street and the intersection of Pine Street at 3rd Street. We have FEMA grant money available for a portion of this project. There are some Borough costs associated with it also. The bid came in at \$508,999.99 which is a bit lower than we had anticipated. Based on the recommendation of our Engineer, we will award this bid and construction will begin on this project. We hope to have construction start on this project by the second week of June. This should be a quick moving project. We are trying to alleviate the flooding in these intersections which flood with every moon tide. They will be elevated.

Last month the Planning Committee presented the Strategic Recovery Planning Report and it was adopted by the Governing Body, which creates a plan for how we recover from Hurricane Sandy and how we move forward. In this document there are several short term goals that we are trying to meet. The SRPR is on the website for those who are not familiar with it. In this report the next step is to move on with the plan. To start to research. How to follow through on the plan and do some studies to move forward. There are costs associated with the studies and we will b applyihng tonight for grant money through the DCA. Hopefully, we will get the grant money for the list of programs listed in tonight's Resolution listed on tonight's Agenda.

We are also preparing for an Auction that will be handled through GovDeals. It disposes of surplus equipment in the Borough. There is a listing in tonight's Agenda as to what will be sold in the auction. This will clear up old stuff that is lying around. It will clear up the upstairs. He thanks Carol Seney in getting this list together and getting this Auction moving forward.

The Borough was successful in our application for the New Jersey Transportation Grant. We received a grant for \$220,000 and this money will go towards the reconstruction of Orange and Harrison Streets, from Poole to Johnson Avenues. This is good news we received. We hope to get this project out to bid soon and if all goes well this work will actually begin sometime in August and be completed by October.

Our Monmouth County Open Space Grant for Scholer Park moves forward. The tot lot is almost completed. There are new security cameras in place which are night vision cameras that should help reduce vandalism and help catch the vandals. The old cameras from Scholer Park have been moved to the beachfront. There is one camera by the Gazebo and one by Firefighters Park. Street lights are there so we don't have to be as concerned about night vision.

Beachfront restoration is moving along. The sod, fencing looks great, a lot of activity. He thanks John Haines and the DPW Dept for being down there working with the Contractor today getting it cleaned up to have it ready for Memorial Day weekend. We are looking for three good weather days to get the painting done on the walkway.

We have an amendment to the Salary Ordinance for two positions. He would like to move this resolution to the end of the meeting because there are some items to be discussed in closed session prior to introduction of Ordinance.

Councilwoman Roche: Public Works & Building and Grounds

The doors in Borough Hall have been repaired. The Police Department Jail Cells have been completed. The donated filing cabinets have been moved to the Construction Office. Bob Burlew and staff are grateful for the donation. The Dept. of Labor State inspection has been done. The Recycling Health and Safety Course has been completed. The Security Course has been completed by John Haines. The beachfront Parking meters have been installed with the help of Vic Tuberion. The purchase of two new ride-on lawnmowers 61" and 72" is complete. The replacing of the HVAC filters at Borough Hall have been done by DPW. The street sweeping has begun and is on-going. The 2014 Turf Maintenance Plan has begun and the work is done early in the day to ensure that the safety of children playing in the afternoon. The repairs on the statue of the Doughboy are on-going. We are hoping to have the statue back in place for Memorial Day weekend. The repair to the WWII and Beachfront monuments are on-going and hopefully will be in place by Memorial Day also. The issues at Scholer Park are on-going and hope to be done by Memorial Day. The fence between Helen Hayes Park and the Police Department is on-going and the Modular Home Deliveries are in progress which Jennifer will be reporting on. Outfall and catch basins cleaning is on-going. Goose problem is being worked on by DPW. The Borough hall roof has been repaired. We are waiting for the rain to make sure. FEMA reimbursements are being worked on by Director and his Assistant. Repairs continue on the DPW buildings. Property clean ups are coming along. Liens are being placed on the properties where required. Vegetation and branch clean-up is coming along. Hockey rink repairs are coming along.

The 1st annual Memorial School Foundation Talent show is on June 5th at 6 p.m. We have 60 middle school volunteers who are ready to show off their talents. The tickets are \$7 for adults and \$5 for children. There will also be shirts for sale. Come out and support the children.

She thanks everyone involved in the emergency, especially Daniel Miller from DPW, Chris Tuberion, and the Dispatchers who cleaned up a real mess at the Borough and did a wonderful job handling a tough situation.

Police Report – April 2014:

Chief Woolley and Captain Ervin attended a Harassment in the Workplace Seminar in Hazlet Township sponsored by JIF. Chief Woolley received a letter from a woman thanking Patrolman Gilkison for helping her with her car trouble. The officers investigated 4 motor vehicle crashes with two injuries at one crash. There was one arrest for DWI. There were 82 motor vehicle summonses issued. Patrolman Gajewski has issued approximately 100 warning notices to motor vehicles which are unlawfully parked in the Borough. The warnings are being issued to correct the parking problem within the Borough. All officers were qualified in firearms training with both 9mm hand guns and shot gun training. All Officers received training in bi-annual training in use of force and motor vehicle pursuits. Sgt. Taddeo and Patrolman Gajewski are enrolled in the Assault rifle instructor school for the June 2014 class. This will allow the Officers to qualify the department in the use of assault rifles. Patrolman Gajewski completed training as firearms instructor and completed crash 1 (crash investigation). Patrolman Gilkison is enrolled in crash 1 for May. Sgt. Taddeo applied for the Click it or Ticket Grant. Captain Ervin has been updating policies which will be distributed to the Officers when competed.

He spoke about Government Surplus last month and he would like to recognize Captain Ervin's hard work in getting us into this program. He spent 6 months of time to get us into this program and Mr. Williams thanks him.

Councilman Andreuzzi: Education, Recreation and Special Grants

Recreation: Summer camp registration will be held here on Friday, May 16th from 7-9 p.m. and again on Saturday May 17th from 10 a.m. till 12 noon. The cost is \$65.00 per child. Camp will run from June 30th until July 25th. Fireworks will be held on Thursday, July 3rd at the Beachfront at approximately 9 p.m. The annual Family Day Picnic will be held on Sunday, August 24th at Helen Hayes Park. The June Meeting will be held on Monday, June 2nd at Borough Hall instead of Tuesday, June 3rd due to Primary Day Elections.

<u>The Board of Education</u> – The Board of Education presented the 2014-2015 Budget at the meeting of April 29th. The Budget will provide education for nearly 700 elementary students and 272 high school students. It will also include Capital Investments, Security enhancements and 21st century technology. The Board of Education has tentatively set a presentation to the Governing Body at next month's Agenda Meeting pending approval of the Mayor. The Union Beach Board of Education Meeting scheduled for Tuesday, June 24th has been rescheduled for Tuesday, June 17th at 7 p.m. in the Media Center. All are invited to attend.

<u>Environmental:</u> This evening, May 15th at 9 .m. Bayshore Regional Watershed Council will engage its first monitoring and tagging of the horseshoe crabs at several sites throughout the Raritan Bay. Union Beach participants will meet at the parking lot at the intersection of Front and Dock Streets. The Watershed Council meets on the 2nd Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. at Keyport Borough Hall. Everyone is invited to attend. Union Beach is represented by Mr. Bart Sutton.

Shared Services:

The Shared Services Agreement with Memorial School has been signed by the Mayor and this will allow us to interchange help between the Borough and the School when needed. This will be good for the taxpayers.

Regarding Councilman Mascilak's report regarding the Storm Booklets, there was a Department Head Meeting prior to this Council Meeting and he has contacted Sheriff Golden to see if he has enough booklets floating around for every residents because it does seem like it would be a very vital resource and very well put together. We hope to have it put up on the website for residents to fill out.

Regarding Councilman Wicki's report, the construction project to begin on 3rd and Pine Street, he was informed by the County today that all of the permits have been received. The wetlands specialist for Monmouth County was supposed to contact the Engineer today to let him know that the intersection with the 4 catch basins that drain out will be started first to try to get it clean out to the marshy areas so that when they raise the street, the line would be already cleared to help us out. The County is putting this project ahead.

Councilman Wicki thanks the County for their help.

Borough Administrators Report Jennifer Maier

A computer rack was installed where the police recording equipment is located at the Borough Hall, 2nd floor. DPW is getting price quotes for the fence gates for the closet so that everything is secured. Fencing was going to start today along the soccer field but due to rain they held off and should start tomorrow.

She requests that a quote from D&R flooring due to an emergency incident for replacement of flooring damaged and some areas that were flooded or without carpet. The total cost of the flooring is \$4500. This would be a mid-cycle check but due to tripping hazards, she would like to move forward with this.

Essential Services Grant: Ms. Maier had a conference call with Andy Zabiega and Mike Pennell, our Finance Staff, and what we were told that they would like the Borough to have the conversation with CDLP for the Community Disaster Loan Program just to see whether we would be depleting our Community Disaster Loan this year or next year, because we can't go for the Essential Services Grant without depleting that first. It appears at this time that we are probably going to have to reapply for the Essential Services Grant next year and Andy and Mike spoke today to Julia regarding the CDLP and they will be re-working the budget to reduce how much we would be getting out of this. CDLP will be letting us know what they would approve. We do not have those numbers yet.

She congratulates Mayor Smith for winning the Monmouth County Investment Board's 2014 Government Partnership Award for Union Beach for being the Town that used the Monmouth County Workforce People in the most responsible way and while at that meeting they announced that we would be getting additional funding from Workforce and she is waiting on what this amount would be.

Zoning Grant: She has a meeting in Trenton next Tuesday to sign the paperwork of this grant.

Local 641 Negotiations: Comments were sent to the Committee. They are meeting on May 22nd.

Police Contract has been signed.

She will be working on the form regarding the Bank owned Property Abatement issues for Bob Parsells.

Prefab Homes: 9 were installed last week, 1 is set for Tuesday or Wednesday and two more for the end of the month. She gave the list to Council of all the addresses. The ribbon cutting is scheduled for June 12th. She will be checking to see if they might used the Florence Avenue Firehouse in case of Rain since there is adequate parking.

Resolutions for the recognition of the Container Companies will be on next month's Agenda.

We are waiting for a heavy rain to test the repairs at the Borough Hall. Sheetrock was removed from the Health Dept. Office and will be removed from the Borough Clerk's Office just to make sure there is no dampness in the wall.

Amano needs to come to the Police Department to repair the computer for the parking meters. The metric contract ends June of 2014 so we will be looking to get this new contract reviewed by the Borough Attorney and move it forward.

Ms. Maier states that the first Department Head Meeting was held with construction, Police, Fire, OEM, EMS, Code Enforcement, DPW and issues regarding the number of homes coming in and issues regarding the contractors and people don't know if they are REMM contractors or not. Discussion of ID Cards to be printed at the Police Dept. Fire Department discussed that they will be requesting that certain homes that have an elevator or solar panels will be required to have a plaque on the front of the building. We are awaiting DCA requirements. OEM discussed the booklets and ramping up for the next storm was discusses. EMS discussed the powerflex stair chairs which they need that are approximately \$4,800 each and spoke about the need to be able to get residents diabetes medication and also the need for eppie pens. Code Enforcement talked about the issues with the abandoned homes and that if anyone sees homes

that are not secure they should let him know. He discussed the pooling of water that is occurring from the depressions from after the demolitions, open swimming pools without fencing and the need for mosquito treatment in the pooling water. Dirt need for some of these holes. He is working with Construction Code for this issue.

DPW will be looking to see what street signs are missing and get them replaced. When a dumpster permit is issued, he will let the other departments know. Radios for department heads on a department head frequency. Need for generators at all the buildings. Information on a new grant that she will be applying for.

Mayor Smith announces that regarding the Grant from the DOT for \$220,000.00 for Orange and Harrison and he would like to mention that this is thanks to the efforts of our Engineers and Dennis Dayback, because in the past these grants were not considered by the DOT but we were able to get Haven Park done and now we are into Cottage Park and we are hoping to get this area done too and we should thank Dennis for all his efforts. This is great news from the DOT.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF UNION BEACH, 1980," CHAPTER VII, TRAFFIC, SECTION 7-6.2, STOP INTERSECTIONS, **SCHEDULE VIII**

Whereas, the Mayor and Council have determined that due to traffic frequency and conflicting flows of traffic that the intersection of Park Avenue and Spruce Street requires a four (4) way stop signs with traffic on both street being required to make a full

NOW THRERFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF UNION BEACH that Chapter VII, Traffic, Section 7-6.2, Stop Intersections, Schedule VII, is hereby amended to include the following:

Park Avenue and Pine Street

The intersection of Park Avenue and Pine Street shall be designated a FOUR-WAY-STOP, with appropriate stop signs on each corner.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that Public Works shall erect stop signs on all four corners in accordance with all applicable NJDOT signs designs and location; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that if any provision, paragraph, section or subsection of this chapter be found unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of this chapter shall remain in full force and effect and shall have continuing validity; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that all other sections of the ordinance remain in full force and effect; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final adoption in accordance with law.
