## Councilman Mascilak: Absent Library, Drug Alliance, EMS and Seniors

Councilman Wicki: Finance, Personnel and Administration

On the Agenda tonight we have the Certification of the Borough's Audit for the year ending December 31, 2013. Our Auditor is performed by Robert Hulsart \& Company. There was one recommendation to the Audit is that they are recommending us to improve our Fixed Asset Tracking System. They recognize that as we are still recovering from the storm, this is something we will get to, but it may take us a little while to set up a program. He has been looking into some bar-coding systems available to connect the bar code stickers on all of our fixed assets to make it easier for us to track our items. Last month, we discussed that some streets have deteriorated to dangerous levels, primarily Henry Street and we explain month after month the limitations that we have in seeking funding for the reconstruction of the roads. We always try to completely rehabilitate a road. It is a very expensive project to undertake. Since Henry Street and Raritan Street are two streets that don't intersect any major roads where we could secure funding from State, Federal or County levels. So we keep looking for a way to seek out funding for these streets. It has gotten to a point where we recognize that something has to be done now. We have gone through the Finance Committee and looked for many ways to seek out the funding. We identified some funding available through some old road project bond ordinances from previous years. In order for us to use this money, we have to re-appropriate the funds. This must be done be Ordinance. Of course we cannot wait for the two months to do this, so we have added an Emergency Appropriations Resolution which will enable us to do some emergency repairs to these two roads. The Emergency Appropriation means that it will be the first thing that comes out of our Budget for next year. We have the money in the Bond Ordinances that we can transfer over so it will not have a negative impact on next year's budget. There is also a change order to the Construction Contract, Lucas, doing the Spruce/Center Street project. They are in town and have agreed to hold the price for all the materials that were obtained for this project and we hope that by the end of August this project should be done. Henry and Raritan should be done by the end of August. This requires bringing in heavy equipment which will be in town for the Third Street portion of the Construction and can be used to do this project also. We are hoping to complete within three to four weeks. We are happy to finally address this problem.

## Public Works \& Building and Ground

American Legion Construction has begun.
DPW - very busy with the Fireworks, Borough Hall Carpeting Installed, painting and moving furniture. John Haines has the repair quotes for the steps at the Library and we hope to have this work completed next month. Busy with the welcome home for the residents with Mrs. Christie's visit. She thanks Daniel Miller for all his help with the Union Beach 5 K and wish him a speedy recovery. She also wishes Bob Headden a speedy recovery. They continue to fill holes as necessary. The Floors at Borough Hall have been done by Bob Headden and he is doing a wonderful job.
The street sweeping continues as weather permits. Painting is continuing down at the beachfront and it looks very nice. Wednesday's volleyball has started and we have a good turnout. We have a new contract with Tru-Green for turf maintenance. The Director is obtaining quotes for the upstairs cages at Borough Hall, Police Dept. She thanks the DPW staff for cleaning the catch basins. The repairs to DPW building are on-going. The employees hired through the Monmouth County Workforce Development Program help facilitate the completion of the work. The repairs to the mechanic's garage are also on-going as time and manpower permit. New workbenches have been installed for the mechanic's use. The property clean-ups are continuing and liens are being placed on properties to seek reimbursement for costs with the help of Code Enforcement Officer, Bob Parsells. The Hockey Rink Repairs are pending and the penalty boxes are currently being rebuilt.

POINT OF ORDER: Mayor Smith congratulates Councilman Williams and his wife on the birth of their daughter last Thursday, Teagan Rose. Congratulations and Good Health.

We have received over $\$ 35,000$ worth of equipment with more pending from the Government Surplus Program. This is an outstanding program for the Borough. He commends Captain Ervin for this. Chief Woolley attended the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police Convention in Atlantic City and attended Seminar on School Safety.
The Police Department investigated nine motor vehicle accidents, with zero injuries. There was one arrest for DWI and there w ere 79 motor vehicle summonses issued in the month of June.

Car No. 14 is at the County Police Services for repair services. The new Tahoe should be delivered this month. The Department has received the new weapons and have scheduled a range date in August to qualify with these new weapons. Patrolman Harriott applied for and received a grant for "Cops in Shops". This grant is to put officers in Liquor Licensed establishments to prevent the sale of alcohol to minors or adults providing alcohol to minors. Officer Trembley is patrolling the Borough streets looking for junked vehicles and pending notices will be issued. Officer Tuberion and Canine Officer Mako were called by Middletown on two occasions, one resulting in a large heroin arrest.

WHEREAS, the Annual Report of Audit for the year ending December 31, 20123has been filed by a Registered Municipal Accountant with the Municipal Clerk pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:5-6, and a copy has been received by each member of the governing body; and,

WHEREAS, R.S. 52:27BB-34 authorizes the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey to prescribe reports pertaining to the local fiscal affairs; and,

WHEREAS, the Local Finance Board has promulgated N.J.A.C. 5:30-6.5, a regulation requiring that the governing body of each municipality shall by resolution certify to the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey that all members of the governing body have reviewed, as a minimum, the sections of the annual audit entitled "Comments and Recommendations, and,

WHEREAS, the members of the governing body have personally reviewed as a minimum the Annual Report of Audit, and specifically the sections of the Annual Audit entitled "Comments and Recommendations, as evidenced by the group affidavit form of the governing body attached hereto; and,

WHEREAS, such resolution of certification shall be adopted by the Governing Body no later than forty-five days after the receipt of the annual audit, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-6.5; and,

WHEREAS, all members of the governing body have received and have familiarized themselves with, at least, the minimum requirements of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey, as stated aforesaid and have subscribed to the affidavit, as provided by the Local Finance Board, and;

WHEREAS, failure to comply with the regulations of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey may subject the members of the local governing body to the penalty provisions of R.S. 52:27BB-52, to wit:

WHEREAS, in the State of New Jersey 216th Legislature A. 2108 was introduced in the Assembly on January 16, 2014 and S. 1041 was introduced in the Senate on January 30, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Bills introduced prohibited treatment, discharge, disposal, or storage of wastewater, wastewater solids, sludge, drill cuttings or other byproducts from natural gas exploration or production using hydraulic fracturing; and

WHEREAS, the term "hydraulic fracturing: shall include "fracking," "hydrofracking," "hydrofracturing," and other colloquial terms for this drilling technique, which refer to the drilling technique of expanding fractures or creating new fractures in rock by injecting water, often with chemicals, sand, or other substances, and often under pressure, into or underneath the surface of the rock for the purposes including, but not necessarily limited to, well drilling and natural gas exploration and production; and
Whereas, the practice of the frilling technique of hydraulic fracturing for natural gas exploration and production has been found to use a variety of contaminating chemicals and materials and uses vast quantities of water mixed with chemicals and solids pumped in the process resulting in
millions of gallons of contaminated water flowing back of the well causing dangers and uncertainties for wastewater treatment plants, the environment and health and safety of the public; and

WHEREAS, wastewater, wastewater solids or sludge, drill cuttings and/or other byproducts from the fracking process have been known to contain toxic levels of contaminants such as benzene, naphthalene, toluene, formaldehyde, diesel, cadmium, mercury, arsenic, and unknown quantities of hundreds of other undisclosed carcinogenic and endocrine-disrupting chemicals, heavy metals, and radioactive materials; and

WHEREAS, Pennsylvania's Department of Environmental Protection has documented three facilities in NJ as accepting waste from hydraulic fracturing operations, posing a direct threat to NJ 's drinking water; and

WHEREAS, the treatment, discharge, disposal, or storage of fracking waste pose a threat to NJ 's air, land, aquifers and surface waters through the risk of spills and accidents, open pit storage, truck transport on roadways, and severe weather events that cause flooding; and

WHEREAS , fracking is exempt from important regulations meant to protect public health and the environment, specifically sections of the Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act, Safe Drinking Water Act, Resource Conversation and Recovery Act, Superfund, and National Environmental Policy act; and

WHEREAS, no federal or State standards have been adopted governing the treatment and disposal of hydraulic fracturing waste;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Borough of Union Beach hereby supports a statewide ban on the treatment, discharge,
disposal, or storage of wastewater, wastewater solids, sludge, drill cuttings or other by products from natural gas exploration or production using hydraulic fracturing.

WHEREAS, an emergency has arisen in the Current Fund with respect to emergency street repairs and no adequate provision was made in the 2014 budget for the aforesaid purpose. The Borough has found it necessary to incur substantial expenditures in one line item in order to protect the Borough residents. Expenditures were necessary to be authorized and timely services completed without affecting the health, public safety and welfare of the residents. WHEREAS, the total amount of the emergency appropriations, including the emergency appropriation authorized by this resolution is $\$ 60,000.00$, which is less than three percent ( $3 \%$ ) of the total current and utility operation appropriations made in the budget for 2014; and
